

"I don't care," she said. "I am not going out there."


I tried to reason with her, but it was no use. Bernhardt was adamant. She was not going to perform, and that was that.

More True Tales From Theatre Press Agent is full of stories like this one. It is a book that will make you laugh, make you cry, and give you a new appreciation for the theatre.



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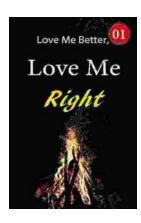


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
